

2024 Patrol Division & Promotions

2024 was an exciting year for the department. The patrol division is the front-line component of the agency and often makes the first impression to the public. Hamilton Township Police strives to exercise our motto of "Guardian Heart, Warrior Spirit" with each encounter we have. The men and women serving in the patrol division are a dedicated group of individuals with a strong sense of community and will continue to serve professionally.

2024 also saw three promotions within the patrol division.

Sgt. Huelsman was promoted to the rank of sergeant from her position as detective. Sgt. Huelsman joined the agency in 2017 with prior service with the Monroe Police Department. Sgt. Huelsman has served as a patrol officer, task force officer, and detective within the agency.

Sgt. Perry was also promoted to sergeant from patrol officer. Sgt. Perry has served the agency since 2020. Before joining the Hamilton Township Police Department, Sgt. Perry served as a trooper with the Ohio State Highway Patrol.

Captain Rector was promoted from the rank of sergeant. Captain Rector has served the township since 2004. During his service with Hamilton Township, he has been a patrol officer, canine handler, and sergeant. Captain Rector now serves as the Patrol Captain of the agency.



Criminal Investigation Division



The Hamilton Township Police Department's Criminal Investigation Division (CID), led by Detective Shawn Parks and Detective Joseph Kibbee, played a crucial role in investigating a wide range of criminal cases throughout 2024. Their work spanned from personal crimes such as sexual assaults, child abuse, and death investigations to property crimes such as business break-ins and vehicle thefts.

Significant Increase in Case Volume

Compared to 2023, CID experienced a dramatic rise in cases, with the most notable increases in sexual assault and child abuse investigations. This surge highlights the growing need for investigative resources and specialized training to address these serious offenses. The increasing prevalence of digital evidence in nearly all investigations underscores the urgent need for continued investment in training, equipment, and resources to effectively combat these crimes.

Combating Online Crimes Against Children

HTPD CID remains an active participant in the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force, targeting online predators who exploit children through digital platforms. In 2024, detectives successfully investigated numerous cases of online sexual exploitation, sexual assault, and child abuse, leading to dozens of arrests and criminal charges.

Commitment to Community Protection

As crime trends continue to evolve, detectives with the Hamilton Township Police Department's Criminal Investigation Division remain committed to relentlessly seeking justice for victims and holding offenders accountable

Warren County Drug Task Force

The Hamilton Township Police Department continues to demonstrate its dedication to combating drug-related crime through its active support of the Greater Warren County Drug Task Force. This specialized, multijurisdictional unit focuses on investigating drug trafficking, prescription drug diversion, money laundering, and a wide range of other drugrelated offenses.

The Greater Warren County Drug Task Force is comprised of personnel from local, state, and federal agencies. These include the Warren County Sheriff's Office, Warren County Prosecutor's Office, Franklin Police Department, Hamilton Township Police Department, Lebanon Police Department, Monroe Police Department, Springboro Police Department, Wilmington Police Department, Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI), Ohio State Highway Patrol, Ohio National Guard – Counter Drug Unit, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). Through continued collaboration and shared commitment, the task force remains a vital force in the fight against illegal drug activity in Warren County and beyond.

Little Miami School Resource Officers

With approximately 1500 kids to 1 School Resource Officer, it is difficult to explain every single type of contact made with staff, visitors, and students in the building. Most of those contacts are summarized as "Administrative or Community Related" type contacts. These types of contacts are usually brief encounters with an individual or groups. Everything from speaking with a parent who enters the building to pick up a child, to walking through the hallways with an officer presence in mind, greeting kids. That officer presence is key to maintaining relationships. That presence allows for students to approach you, sometimes with problems of their own, sometime just to say hi and break down the unseen barriers. Most importantly, an officer presence is a deterrence. The hope is always to deter problems before they ever happen.

Building Security

First and foremost, keeping the building secure is the first line of defense against a threat. Monthly drills to maintain compliance is our way of ensuring that the building, teachers, and classrooms function as they should in an emergency. Building security checks are done every day, multiple times a day, in order to prevent threats from the outside before they can ever happen. Lockdown drills are completed with district staff and Safety Directors from the Board of Education in order to observe and correct any flaws in the safety plan. Notes are taken during each test in order to correct mistakes and make the school safer going forward.



K9 Division



Kahn is a dual-purpose police K9 trained in narcotics detection, tracking, building searches, evidence searches, and apprehension. In 2024, Kahn and Officer Stephens completed 170 hours of training and attended the National Association of Professional Canine Handlers (NAPCH) in Alpena, MI. Kahn became nationally certified in all areas in which he is trained.

Overview



Kahn had 105 total deployments, resulting in 7 arrests and multiple drug and drug paraphernalia seizures. Kahn performed multiple tracks and helped to locate a suicidal subject who had jumped out of their vehicle and run into the woods. Kahn also assisted with several article searches, which resulted in the recovery of evidence and lost property. Having a police K9 is a great asset to any department. They are a force multiplier and help to deescalate tense situations that could potentially result in the use of force by officers. Kahn assisted in the arrest of several subjects with felony warrants, which resulted in successful apprehension and zero use of force incidents.

Training Report

The Hamilton Township Police Department takes great pride in its commitment to ensuring officers are thoroughly trained and prepared for their roles. Not only do our officers complete the mandatory hours of training given by the state, our officers attend additional training to further their knowledge and skills.
